St. Andrew's Parish to Hold Auction June 4 (Special to The Sun) BILLERICA, May 31—Elaborate plans are under way for a mammoth auction to be held Saturday, June 4, at 10 a. m., at St. Andrew's parish hall, North Billerica. Proceeds of the affair are for the proposed parochial school for the North Billerica area. Dr. S. C. Hajjar, general chairman of the auction, said today that hundreds of items have already been donated for the event, including household goods, lawn furniture, radios, TVs, tools, antiques, chinaware and many other articles. Dr. Hajjar added that more donations are sought in order to make this the biggest and best auction ever held. Residents having articles they wish to donate may bring them to the church hall, or phone the rectory and the items will be picked up. Also, Dr. Hajjar asked that ladies of the parish be requested to donate food for the refreshment stand on Saturday, including cake, cup cakes, sandwiches or any other food items. These articles may be brought to the hall on the morning of the event.

Impressive Memorial day exercises were held yesterday, with a street parade from the town common along Andover road to the Fox Hill cemetery, where prayers and exercises took place at the monument on the common. The procession included a special police escort, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars marching units, auxiliaries, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scout units, VFW float, two bands and Gold Star mothers. In the evening a bazaar concert was held on the common from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m., with hundreds of persons in attendance.

St. Anthony novena devotions will be combined with the May feast day. The hour has been set for 7:15.

Many Attend Dedication of Chelmsford War Memorial

(Special to The Sun) CHELMSFORD, May 31—Dedication of the new war memorial on the Center common to the dead of all the wars featured yesterday's observance of Memorial day, with Rep. Edward J. DeSaulnier, Jr., giving the brief dedicatory address after unveiling the granite monument. The dedication came at the conclusion of the annual parade through the Center with the Legion Auxiliary, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cubs and Brownies, along with a group from the Silver Spurs horse club, making up the line of march, with the high school band and baton twirlers. Chelmsford, past commander, led the parade, with Capt. George Peterson, Spanish war veteran, riding at the head of the procession. Services were held at the Forefathers cemetery and at the Revolutionary monument at the common prior to the dedication. Past Commander Harvey conducted exercises of dedication, with Legionnaires from the East, Center and North taking part. Two wreaths were placed on the monument after Rev. Warren M. Chandler had given the invocation, the high school glee club sang a selection and President Thomas Gallagher of the high school senior class gave Lincoln's Gettysburg address. Rep. DeSaulnier then unveiled the monument and in a brief talk urged for a greater demonstration by the civilian population on behalf of the veterans.

Tewksbury Salk Shots to Be Given

Here Tomorrow TEWKSBURY, May 31—Tomorrow at 9 a. m. at the North street and the Shawheens schools the children of the first and second grades will be administered the Salk anti-polio vaccine. The exact number to be given the shots will not be known until after the signed cards are in from the parents but the local supply that was received will be more than adequate to take care of at least some 550 children whose parents originally gave their consent. However, the number to be vaccinated will be considerably less than this figure since there have been a number of withdrawals submitted by parents whose children have come down with colds or illness within the last week. Those who are not in top health, added to those whose parents submitted withdrawals because of uncertainty over the program may bring the final number to less than 500 children. Dr. Joseph Sulmasy, health agent, and Dr. George Ryan, who recently located an office in South Tewksbury, will administer the vaccine at the two elementary schools, assisted by Mrs. Ora MacLaren RN, school nurse, and Mrs. Jean Mann, RN, former school nurse.
